(Mostly clipped from our exchanges.) The ladies of Albion are organizing a dramatic association. The prisoners in the Wayne county jail had a prime turkey dinner Thanksgiving day.

At the recent sitting of the Grand Jury of Wayne county, twenty-six indictments were found. There were 27 marriages, 133 births, and 107 deaths reported in the city of Rochester during the month of November last.

A creditable drive is on foot in Rochester. It is to provide labor to the amount of \$15,000 for the poor during the winter in breaking stone for Macadamized roads.

On Tuesday of this week two men named Allen and McDonald, were arrested in Rochester, charged with committing a burglary in Clyde, and were sent there for examination. Rochester journalists were very happy yesterday because there were no arrests the previous night.

The life members of the Western New York Agricultural Society are requested by the Secretary to meet on Wednesday, Dec. 20th, at the Court House in Rochester.

A young man named John Conley was run over by the Express train near Chili station on Tuesday night. He had been to a party in Churchville, and it is supposed that while he was walking home along the railroad track, he was struck by the Express train.
